McNary High, in its first year of existence has become a distinctive school. An element which has made it so is the unique coat of arms.

One of the few schools to have an official crest in Oregon, it is composed of a traditional Scottish thistle and wreath placed above a shield and crossed Claymore war swords. Found on the left side of the shield is a beaver, indigenous of Oregon. On the other side is a royal Scottish lion. Within the shield an American eagle, the symbol of Senator McNary's many years of service to his country, occupies a place of prominence. A leaping salmon symbolizes both the basic source of food for the original settlers of the area and a form of recreation. A Celtic cross depicts the spirit of the pioneers. The traditional symbol of education, a lighted torch, signifies youth's perpetual search for knowledge. Located around the base of the torch are berries, the symbol of the agriculture important to this area.

This crest, therefore, expresses the past, the present, and the future. Because of this, it is meaningful to every student.



The symbol of this yearbook, McNary's first, is the Claymore war sword. To the Celts of old, the sword represented strength, power, and pride. As the Celtics of McNary High, we should value the strength and power of the education we have received and vow to never stop learning. We should be proud of ourselves and of our school for through this combined effort we are shaped into strong, dependable individuals. It is sincerely hoped that as you turn the pages of the Claymore, you will bee the sights, once again, which meant the most to you, the things which highlighted 1965-1966.



The school board is a community service organization which performs several duties pertaining to the efficient function of our district's schools. The board determines all general policies for school district 24J as well as more technical matters. The members handle problems concerning school transportation, financing, a set curriculum, establishment of boundaries for district schools, rules governing both teachers and students, employment of teaching and administrative staffs, school budgets, and other minor rulings, such as library and lunchroom procedures.

The members of the school board are elected by popular vote as representatives of parents of students and property owners. They are elected in June for a term of five years.

The school board members meet on the second and fourth Thursdays of every month in the Administration Building on Ferry Street in Salem. Faculty members, townspeople, and Superintendent of Schools, Charles D. Schmidt, are also present at these meetings.

The members of the school board include: Mrs. Sherrilyn Maltby, Chairman; Sid Boise, Vice-chairman; James B. Daniels; Henry Hohwiesner, Jr.; and A. T. King. The District Clerk, Connell C. Ward, is a general secretary to the board.





With a fine start this year and many returning athletes next year, prospects for future McNary Lettermen's Club are bright.



A tea and spring fashion show were held for Whitteaker Junior High's ninth grade girls to give the younger girls an idea of what to expect in high school Home Economics classes.










Grapplers Battle to Prominence




